

Weighing Free Speech Against Protection: Violence in the Media
A Future of American Media Caucus Briefing

Jeff McIntyre is a Senior Legislative and Federal Affairs Officer for the American Psychological Association, covering issues regarding media and telecommunications, criminal justice, and international issues. He was recently appointed to the FCC's Task Force on Media and Children's Health and serves as Co-Chair of the Children's Media Policy Coalition. He was named to the White House Task Force on Navigating the New Media, served as an advisor to the FCC's V-Chip Task Force and the Federal Trade Commission's Study on the Marketing of Violence to Children. Jeff was part of the negotiation team for the development of a new television ratings system.

Caroline Fredrickson is the director of the American Civil Liberties Union's Washington Legislative Office, leading all federal lobbying for the nation's oldest and largest civil liberties organization. Prior to joining the ACLU, Fredrickson was the general counsel and legal director for NARAL Pro-Choice America. She has years of experience as a senior staffer on Capitol Hill, and was a special assistant to the President for legislative affairs in 1998 and 1999. Fredrickson has published on various topics including labor law and German and American anti-discrimination law in the *Brooklyn Journal of Law & Policy*, *Columbia Law Review*, *The New York Times* and *Change: The Magazine of Higher Learning*. Fredrickson received her law degree from Columbia University, where she served on the *Columbia Law Review* and co-founded the *Columbia Journal of Gender and Law*.

Robert Kesten is the executive director of TV-Turnoff Network, an international non-profit organization based in Washington, DC. TV-Turnoff Network is best known for its annual campaign, "TV-Turnoff Week," now in its twelfth year. The Network is focused on empowering people to use technology responsibly and encouraging people to take time for themselves, their families and their communities - even though it means turning the television, computer and game screens off. Prior to joining TV-Turnoff Network, Mr. Kesten established and ran The Director's View Film Festival in Connecticut and New York City. He is an accomplished producer and a member of the National Legislative Committee of the Screen Actors Guild. He has appeared in five feature films, and continues to host a bi-monthly radio program. Mr. Kesten is a former Vice Chairman of the Connecticut Film and Television Commission, Adjunct Professor of theater and film at the University of Connecticut, and public school teacher. He has also worked extensively in politics and public policy, including work in the Middle East during the first Gulf War and in the Ukraine during the breakup of the former USSR.

Todd Flournoy is the Vice President and Senior Counsel for Federal Affairs and Policy for the Motion Picture Association of America. Mr. Flournoy handles a wide variety of congressional affairs and federal policy matters relating to all aspects of the motion picture industry, and serves as the Association's principal liaison to federal agencies on all matters affecting member company production issues including immigration, regulatory compliance and outreach. Prior to moving over to the Federal Affairs and Policy Department, Mr. Flournoy worked in the MPAA's State Legislative Affairs where he was responsible for managing all state legislative issues affecting the motion picture industry - primarily those relating to First Amendment issues. He led the Association's state anti-piracy and "anti-camcorder" laws. Prior to joining the MPAA, Todd worked as a Presidential Appointee at the U.S. Department of Labor, a senior staff member of the U.S. Department of Justice, and as a Congressional staff member.
